

Electricity bills prague

It costs EUR0.70 to shower for 10 minutes in . If you are showering for 10 minutes once a day, it will cost you a total of EUR21 per month. If you decide to reduce showers to 5 minutes, you would save EUR10.50.

It costs EUR0.88 to have a bath in . If you are taking a bath once a day, it will cost you a total of EUR26.4 per month. If you decide to reduce number of baths from every day to every 2nd day, you would save EUR13.20.

It costs EUR5.26 to charge an electric vehicle in . If you are charging an electric vehicle once a day, it will cost you a total of EUR157.8 per month. If you decide to charge your electric vehicle every 2nd day, you would save EUR78.90.

It costs EUR0.09 to run the washing machine in . If you are running the washing machine once a day, it will cost you a total of EUR2.7 per month. If you decide to running the washing machine every 2nd day, you would save EUR1.35.

It costs EUR0.04 to vacuum for 10 minutes in . If you are vacuuming for 5 minutes once a day, it will cost you a total of EUR1.2 per month. If you decide to vacuum every 2nd day, you would save EUR0.60.

It costs EUR0.04 to use a hairdryer for 10 minutes in . If you are using a hairdryer for 10 minutes once a day, it will cost you a total of EUR1.2 per month. If you decide to use the hairdryer for 5 minutes, you would save EUR0.60.

It costs EUR0.07 to watch 1 hour of TV in . If you are watching 1 hour of TV once a day, it will cost you a total of EUR2.1 per month. If you decide to reduce tv usage by 2 hours a day, you would save EUR1.05.

Ahhh, utilities. Gas and water and electricity. They're not very exciting, but at some point during your time in Prague, you may actually need to pay for them - or have an argument with the landlord or the electricity company over how much you're being asked to pay.

Depending on your rental agreement, you may have a utilities fee included in the rental price; in that case, your landlord will handle payments. If, however, you own your apartment or the utilities have been registered in your name, you'll have to take care of paying the bills and probably a whole bunch of other details besides. Here, in the first of our series on utilities in Prague, is a primer on that accessing that all-important physical phenomenon: electricity.

The site has a great deal of advice and technical information in English about all utilities services in Prague, including how to sign up for service, how to troubleshoot a broken meter, and payment methods (at the moment, however, many of their online forms seem to be unavailable).



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The company that runs the electricity in Prague and Roztoky is called Pra?sk? energetika, a.s., and they seem to be quite customer-service-friendly. If you need to speak with someone directly, PRE has several customer centers, in Pragues 1, 4, and 9. Your best bet is the Prague 1 center if you require English-language service. Its address is:

How often will my meter be checked?Your electricity meter is inspected once ever four months to determine how much you?ve used. If you live in an apartment building, there will be notices posted in the hallway a few days before the inspector comes. Your bill will also indicate on the bottom left-hand corner of the first page under Zpr?va pro z?kazn?ka the estimated date of the next inspection.

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
